## FARRAR1

\*1. WILLIAM¹ FARRAR, baptized 28 April 1583 at Croxton, Lincolnshire,² was the third son of John Farrar the Elder (died 1628³) of Croxton and of St. Mary, Aldermanbury, London, and his wife (married 25 Aug. 1574, St. Sepulchre's Without Newgate, London) Cicely Kelke, daughter of William Kelke (died 1552) of Barnetby-le-Wold, Lincolnshire. William¹ Farrar's father was of an ancient family of Ewood, in Midgley, Parish of Halifax, Yorkshire. He was a relative of Nicholas Ferrar, Sr. (1544-1620), a merchant and leading member of the Virginia Company.⁴

William<sup>1</sup> Farrar left London, 16 March 1617/8, in the *Neptune* with Lord De La Warr and reached Virginia in Aug. 1618. Ten persons, including two servants, were killed at "Mr. Farrar's house" on the Appomatuck River in the massacre of March 1622/3,<sup>5</sup> but his patent there was not recorded until May 1625.<sup>6</sup> In 1623/4 when the census was taken he was living at Jordan's Journey,<sup>7</sup> where, aged 31, his muster was recorded jointly with that of \*Mrs. Sisley Jordan,

aged 24, 1624/5. He had been appointed administrator of the estate of her husband, Samuel Jordan, 19 Nov. 1623. His interest in the widow Cicely Jordan thrust him into considerable prominence in colonial records since she, within three or four days of her husband's death, seemingly, agreed to become, in due course, the wife of the Rev. Greville Pooley, who sought to hold her to her promise. But William¹ Farrar was also a contender for her hand, and the successful one, causing the first breach of promise suit in America of record. The case reached London where the Council for Virginia returned it to Virginia, "not knowinge how to decide so nice a difference" and desired "the resolution of Civill Lawiers." The matter was resolved, Jan. 1624/5, when Mr. Pooley withdrew his suit and gave bond that he would make no further claim. Thereafter Farrar and Mrs. Jordan were married for, at a court held 2 May 1625, Farrar's bond as administrator was ordered cancelled.

On 14 March 1625/6 William<sup>1</sup> Farrar was appointed to the Council and he served there appearntly for the rest of his life.<sup>11</sup> He was named, Aug. 1626, a commissioner "for the Upper Partes kept above Persie's Hundred," with authority to determine whether court should be held at Jordan's Journey or at Shirley Hundred.<sup>12</sup> The appointment was affirmed 7 March 1627/8.<sup>13</sup>

John Farrar the Elder in his 1628 will had bequeathed property in Great Amwell, Hoddesdon and Broxburne, Hertfordshire, and £20 annuities from the Farrar estate, "Ewood," in Yorkshire, to his son William Farrar and £50 at his return to England. He did return, briefly, for on 6 Sept. 1631 William Farrar of London, Gent., sold his brother Henry Farrar of Reading, Berkshire, for £200 the properties and annuities so bequeathed, and, since John Farrar had reserved these bequests to William's wife and children, the names of "Cecily his wife and Cecily and William his children" appear in the deed. He returned to Virginia and died in 1637, before 11 June, when his young son William<sup>2</sup> received a patent as his heir.

Cicely, whose maiden name is not known, came to Virginia in the Swan with Sir Thomas Gates, arriving near the end of Aug. 1611.15 She married (1) Baley, by whom she had a daughter \*1. Temperance Baley (see BAYLY-COCKE), and (2) \*1. Samuel Jordan (see JORDAN, Samuel), by whom she had daughters Mary and Margaret Jordan.

Charles City County, and William Farrar, Thomas Farrar and John Farrar. 18

3. WILLIAM<sup>2</sup> FARRAR (William<sup>1</sup>), born 1627, as "sonne and heire to William Farrar, late of Henrico, dec'd.," received a patent, 11 June 1637, for 2000 acres in Henrico County, joining on the east the glebe land of Varina, on the west the bottom of [\_\_] Island, on the south the main river and on the north the woods. <sup>19</sup> On 1 Oct. 1649 he gave 200 acres of this, next to the glebe, to his brother John<sup>2</sup>. <sup>20</sup>

Additional land amounting to 335 acres was assigned to Capt. William<sup>2</sup> Farrar and Thomas Ligon, 3 Oct. 1664, in Henrico on the south side of James River "in Mount Malada [Mount My Lady] field, against a place where an old oven stood."<sup>21</sup> This land, reported deserted by 22 July 1671, was regranted to Mr. Henry Randolph.<sup>22</sup>

He was captain of militia by 17 Sept. 1655<sup>23</sup> and in 1661 was captain of the company from Turkey Island Creek to the falls on the north side of James River (except Curles).<sup>24</sup> He was a justice of Henrico County by 1 Aug. 1657<sup>25</sup> and served as a member of the House of Burgesses from Henrico, 1660 and 1661-76.<sup>26</sup> His will, 6 May 1676-Feb. 1677/8,<sup>27</sup> left land to sons William, John and Thomas, the last two under age, but did not name his daughters. He also left to his brother Capt. John<sup>2</sup> Farrar two tracts of land at Capt. Davis' bottom, totaling 500 acres, if John<sup>2</sup> would relinquish land formerly given him, called Coles' Field. Accordingly, 1 Feb. 1677/8, John<sup>2</sup> Farrar deeded back to the heirs

of Col. William<sup>2</sup> Farrar the 200 acres given him in 1649,<sup>28</sup>

He married Mary \_\_\_ who was mentioned as administratrix of his estate 20 Aug. 1682.<sup>29</sup>

5. WILLIAM<sup>3</sup> FARRAR (William<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>), deposed, 20 Feb. 1681/2, he was aged 24 and, March 1710/11, he was aged about 50.<sup>33</sup> He was a justice of Henrico, 1685-1715, sheriff, 1690-92, 1712-13, captain of militia, 1698, and member of the House of Burgesses, 1700-02.<sup>34</sup> He held 700 acres in Henrico County, 1704. He married (1), 1680, Priscilla Baugh, living 1 May 1700 when she relinquished dower in land, <sup>35</sup> daughter of William Baugh, Jr., and his wife Jane, later Mrs. Jane Gower, who in her will, 7 Dec. 1710-Jan. 1710/11, made bequests to her grandchildren William, Abell and Priscilla Farrar. <sup>36</sup> He married (2), before 1 March 1706/7, <sup>37</sup> Mary (Tanner) Ligon, widow of 5. William<sup>3</sup> Ligon (see HARRIS, Thomas), who was granted administration on his estate, 3 April 1721.<sup>38</sup>

in 1684, despite a deposition, 1 April 1689, that he was then aged 24.41 He married (1) 10. Mary<sup>3</sup> Ligon (see HARRIS, Thomas) and (2), 1685-86, 42 17. Katherine3 Perrin (see ROYALL). He held 1444 acres in Henrico County, 1704. On 5 Feb. 1727/8 when he sold his portion, 550 acres, of the Farrar's Island tract to Thomas Randolph, 43 he was of St. James Parish, which became Goochland County that year. His will, 28 Feb. 1740/1-15 June 1742, named his wife Katherine, sons John and Joseph, daughters Martha, Mary and Sarah Farrar and Katherine Barnet.44

JOHN3 FARRAR (William2, William1) deposed, 2 April 1695, he was aged 25.48 He married, 11 Nov. 1691,49 Temperance (Brown) Batte, widow of Thomas Batte and daughter of John Brown and his wife Sarah (later Mrs. John Woodson).<sup>50</sup> Mrs. Sarah Woodson in her will, 24 Feb. 1701/2-1 Oct. 1704,<sup>51</sup> named her daughter Temperance Farrar and grandchildren Martha Batte, John

Farrar and Mary Farrar. John<sup>3</sup> Farrar held 600 acres in Henrico County, 1704, and was alive, April 1721.<sup>52</sup> John Sutton Farrar was granted administration on the estate of Temperance Farrar, 5 Feb. 1721/2.<sup>53</sup>

WILLIAM<sup>4</sup> FARRAR (William<sup>3</sup>, William<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>), of Goochland County, eldest son and heir to Farrar's Island, left will 14 Nov. 1743-14 June 1744.<sup>54</sup> He married Sarah \_\_\_\_, who relinquished dower rights, 6 Jan. 1727/8, when he sold 686 acres on Farrar's Island to Thomas Randolph.<sup>55</sup>
